From the Rector

Dear Members and Friends of St. Peter's,

We are at the half way time of our Lenten journey, and I trust we are experiencing the blessings of following the rigors of Lent. For some this means giving up something dear to them and for others it is taking on a new thing that is difficult and challenging. Whatever may be our discipline of choice, it is thought to be helpful for us in our inner journey towards the heart of God. Inner journey is often made easier by focusing less on the exterior, which is the gift of Lent. An inner journey would help us understand what is really important as individuals and as churches. Going after and satisfying the more immediate and visible needs throw us off from the path of our original purpose and mission in life.

At the annual retreat of your vestry in March, we talked about how we can truly become a missional church or a mission-shaped church. In a mission-based church the spirituality that we seek is more than intimacy with God and more than communion with God. Jesus would have defined spirituality in terms of loving God and loving our neighbors. In other words, we can't have a mystical experience with God if we are wrong with our neighbor. At the retreat we also listed all that we do at St. Peter's and highlighted the ones we do well under what is called Appreciative Inquiry; a management practice for organizational development. We concluded that St. Peter's is well underway in being a missional church. We see the world as the horizon for God's mission as said in our mission statement. We see our immediate neighborhood, as well as Appalachia and El Salvador, as the contexts of our mission location. We see the Spirit of God going ahead of us and calling us into mission. What we do internally in the church is to form us, inform us, and equip us to be disciples to do God's mission outside the four walls of the church. Each Sunday we are gathered in church and after our time of worship and being with each other in God's presence, we are sent out into the world as agents of reconciliation to heal the sick, feed the hungry, clothe the naked, and sooth the suffering.

Before long Lent will transition into Holy Week, which culminates in the celebration of Easter. For us and for all the Christians around the world, Easter brings the joy and hope of resurrection, not only promising life after death but also life in the here and now of our deathly Good Friday world. Easter hope does not take no for an answer; it challenges what the world wants us to believe in status quo as the given. Neither oppressive forces such as power, control or money nor systemic orders such as ideologies is strong enough to hold down the power of creator God in a tomb. This is the power we are endowed with as we are sent out into the broken world to witness the love of God to reconcile all things to Himself.

Pray that we find the remaining days of Lent a blessing, Holy Week meaningful and Easter joyful and hopeful.

Deacon's Roundtable

As we continue to travel through Lent, let us look at what may be a meaningful period of time and instruction for us. We usually look at Lent as a time to focus on our need to repent. The opposite side of the Lenten coin is forgiveness. We are fully aware of what it is like to be hurt by someone. We are very cognizant of what happens to us when these hurts remain in our memories. They dwell within us. We ruminate over them again and again. Their presence in our lives cast a shadow over our thoughts and our actions. That is why forgiveness is so necessary.

How do we go about ridding ourselves of these depressing thoughts and actions?

First, we must deal with the situation that hurt us instead of running from it or burying it deep within our memories.

Second, we must talk through the pain this hurt has caused us either with ourselves or with a friend. Get it out into the open so that God can heal you. This is one of the reasons for the healing stations we have set up during our services on Sunday mornings.

Third, we must learn that no matter what has happened or how deeply we have been hurt, God loves us unconditionally. God not only loves us but also those who have caused us pain.

Finally, when we are ready, speak words of forgiveness for the person who has caused you pain.

No matter who we are or how far we have fallen, God loves all of us. God forgives us. God longs to draw us close to his heart. By understanding this truth, even in its most elementary level, we will find ourselves willing to forgive – yes even those we consider to be our enemies. God's love has the power to have love born within us.

When we find the grace to forgive, we allow God to free us from the resentment, anger, and guilt that have bound us up. Let us open our

hearts to the grace of forgiveness and bathe in the forgiveness that God wants to share with us.

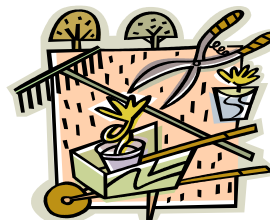
