From the Rector

Dear Friends,

The liturgical year begins appropriately with the season of Advent, a period of four weeks leading to Christmas; a time waiting in expectation and anticipation for God's birth among us as one of us. Unfortunately, in our western culture, this season coincides with the most intense shopping time of the year, a month of rampant consumerism. Instant gratification is the norm of our culture as we are bombarded with messages of how we can immediately satisfy our cravings at the switch of a button. The motto is why wait when you can have it now, luring us to impulsive buying and swift enjoyment. In such a context, the church's message of Advent waiting is counter cultural.

Waiting, in hopeful expectancy and not in dreadful anxiety, is what Advent calls for. During these four weeks we will discover in our reading of the scriptures the many people who were waiting for the Messiah, the Christ. Along with Mary, Joseph, Zechariah and Elizabeth, Symeon and Anna, the shepherds from nearby, the magi from afar were all waiting. However, the inn, the commercial enterprise, in Bethlehem was not waiting, because they were full up, a condition that doesn't engender waiting. Waiting in hopeful expectancy requires space, an emptiness in us that needs to be filled.

Waiting is hard and difficult, and yet it is something we all do all the time. We wait for a reply to an e-mail we had sent, or a call from our doctor with results from a diagnostic test done recently, or a letter from a prospective employer, or for the light to turn green on our way to work. As I write this letter, we are waiting for an end to the war in Iraq and Afghanistan, and we are waiting for the end of the spread of Ebola virus in West Africa. Thankfully the waiting of the millions of undocumented aliens in this country has ended by the executive order of the president. Sometimes, we wonder, "will our wait for world peace ever happen" or "will our wait for human rights of all people will ever occur in our life time?" Scripture tells us that there is a time for everything – the fullness of time, when a baby shall be born.

This waiting we are called to enter into by the scriptures is not a passive waiting; rather it is an active waiting of preparing ourselves. Just as we await the possibility of God in us, God waits for us to be ready to implant the God self in us. While the season of Advent is the reenactment of the waiting for Baby Jesus, our waiting today is for the fulfillment of the coming of the Kingdom of God that is yet to come.

Let us pray that we be found awake, alert and active in our waiting for the coming of the Kingdom of God.

Deacon's Roundtable

"Watch, therefore; you do not know when the lord of the house is coming, whether in the evening or at midnight, or at cockcrow, or in the morning...."
(Mark 13:35)

I have been reading a historical novel by Laurene Chinn entitled "Marcus." It relates how Mark, the gospel writer, grew up as a Jew of the Levite family. He knew Jesus and heard much of his teaching when Jesus spent time with Mark's family in Bethany. When Jesus was crucified, rose from the dead on the third day and then ascended into heaven it was thought that Jesus would return imminently; that is, within the disciple's life time.

Jesus had told his disciples that he would return to set up His kingdom on earth. It was not until much later that the believers would realize that Jesus' return was not to be that imminent. Thus we have the season of Advent to begin our Christian year.

Advent is a season of preparation. Not a preparation for the coming of Jesus as an infant, but as a preparation for the second coming of Jesus in a special way. Jesus coming will be unannounced and it will usher in a period when God's reign will be one of love. All darkness and sin will vanish and God will be present for everyone. Be watchful, Jesus declares, for you never know ...

We can read another interpretation here, for God is likely to come into our lives at just about any moment. It would be well for us to watch for such moments: God in each person we work or live with; God in each stranger we pass on the street; God in a crowded theater; God in the classroom; or God in the privacy of our homes.

Be watchful, be ready. Be prepared to see and recognize God in all places and all circumstances. You never know when overwhelming Grace will make its presence known to you through some unexpected event or presence. I pray you all have an expectant Advent.

Shirley and I wish each and every one of you a Holy and Blessed Christmas.

A Word From Deacon II

A Beautiful Guy

Just a few months ago, I met a beautiful guy. He showed up at church one Sunday and began asking around if there was a way that he could be of some help to the hungry or homeless. What struck me immediately is that this fellow felt as though he had a *duty* to help those in need. We talked for a bit; I will tell you that I liked him right away.

Within a few days he was helping out at The Good Samaritan Shelter, providing rides to various services for people that he had just met. Before long he was helping out at St. Peter's Church, preparing lunch for folks in need. This didn't seem like enough for him. So, he made a seemingly preposterous suggestion. After giving the background that he lived alone in a four bedroom house following the passing of his parents, he suggested that he give me a key to his house, and I could drop off people there that were in need of a place to stay. The explanation was this. "It's not my house, I gave it to Christ."

I recoiled in surprise and a bit of terror. "You can't just do that," I explained. His expression forced me to explain that people might take advantage of the situation and that furthermore, everyone has to pay something for housing. He just shrugged.

My work at The Good Samaritan Shelter informs me that I know people that have just such a need, but I felt that a program laden with

rules and precautions would have to be put into place.

I met with Nate Hoffer, the Executive Director, and later with Tim Barr, Resident Manager, both from Good Samaritan Shelter. I was a bit relieved when both of these guys had the same look of wonder that I had, and responded with something like my own..."You can't just do that." It was Nate who finally said "Why not?"

Together we met with this kind gentleman, to explain all of the precautions and rules necessary. He discarded them all. When we suggested that, at the very least, a modest rent should be paid, and taking part in household chores should be required, he vetoed both. We settled on this. Participants should go to church and Bible study weekly, at the place of their own choosing. When he left we were all still shaking our heads, torn between "You can't do that," and "Why can't you"?

Within a few days we had tracked down a former resident of the shelter and made the offer to him. He never said "What's the catch?" but you could measure its presence. It's early in this ministry, but I can report that... so far/so good. I think about the words of my Bishop, Bishop Daniels and his call for us all of us to be about "crazy ministry."

Now I wonder who the crazy people really are. Is it the man that offers heat and warmth and safety and friendship within his own home to strangers, or is it the rest of us that rationalize all of the reasons why this is unsafe, or not helpful, or enabling or...just plain crazy.

I think about the guest rooms, in houses like my own, with the perfectly made bed and the pretty pillows, and how they go unused for very long stretches. Empty warm comfortable rooms, while others have no place to rest their head.

Yep, it's crazy alright. Crazy in a Jesus sort of way.

Food Pantry Update

The Pantry Committee would like to take this opportunity to thank all who have so generously helped with the pantry and breakfast ministry this past year. So many of you have stepped up to the plate when we needed food items, have contributed funds so we can buy needed supplies, or have given of their time to volunteer on Saturdays to help make the pantry and kitchen run smoothly.

We have had an increase in our client base this past year with 15 to 20 new families coming each week for food. It has been heartening to see more Spanish speaking families taking advantage of this program. To this end we have provided the 2015 Pantry Schedule in both English and Spanish. If anyone is fluent in

Spanish and feels called to help, we could utilize your talent in signing our Spanish speaking friends into the system.

As this is being written before the Thanksgiving Pantry we estimate that we will have upward of 150 families coming for turkey and fixings for this year. We are truly blessed to have 125 turkeys provided by the Chester County Food Bank and the fixings provided by employees at Glaxo-Smith-Kline.

Beginning in January we are planning to expand the pantry to Monday evenings following the usual Saturday offering. This will require more volunteer help with picking up needed items and to help with the pantry itself on those evenings. Hot Meals and More

Served by the community from our kitchen.



Several years ago, Pastor Buddy Goodwin, along with his wife Belinda, began serving lunch twice a week to folks in need from Phoenixville. Under the Goodwin's Growth Ministries, this became known as Your Place Soup Kitchen, and St. Peter's Episcopal lent their expansive kitchen and the use of their building to their volunteer effort.

This inspired ministry has broadened and encouraged many more to be in the service of providing meals. Here is a list of programs that have joined in the work, all using St. Peter's as a meeting place.

Weekday lunches

serving approximately thirty-five daily.

Monday: Gabriel's Kitchen Group. This means that for the first time, a lunch is available each weekday.

Tuesday: Growth Ministries serves lunch, with pizza donated by several Phoenixville area businesses: Bob's Haven Deli and T.D. Alfredos and other kind contributors.

Wednesday: St. Ann's provides a home-prepared meal.

Thursday: First Presbyterian Church provides a home-prepared meal.

Friday: St. Peter's serves a full meal, with the main course provided through the generosity of Mr. Hampshire, owner of The Great American Pub, and the energetic efforts of Chef John Sakos, who combines his passion for food and service to others.

Pizza, Pizza! In addition to the full meal donated weekly by The Great American Pub, several local business have a long history of providing weekly pizzas. Bob's Haven Deli and T.D.Alfredos. along with others are kind contributors.

Saturday Breakfast and Food Pantry.

On alternating Saturdays, Breakfast is served by a revolving group of volunteers from St. Peter's, Washington Memorial Chapel and Vineyard Community Church. Following Breakfast, groceries are distributed to more than 100 families, and residents of St. Peter's Place.

Saturday Lunch

Once per month, on a week without the food pantry open, St. Gabriel's Kitchen provides lunch.

Saturday Dinner

Once per month dinners are provided home cooked meals by Vineyard Community Church.

The Access to Food Group

This new program was started early this year as an effort to coordinate information about meals available in Phoenixville. We are still creating our ultimate mission focus, which includes expanding meals and groceries to those on the North Side of town.

Going Further...

As proud as all can be of this terrific shared ministry, there is more that is needed, and more that we can do. While we celebrate the work and generosity of so many, we continue to reach out until we can say that everyone in our community has the chance to be served, or to serve a meal, with dignity. Financial Update: January through October 2014

The financial position of St. Peter's through October, 2014 is outlined below.

- **Income**

- Open plate donations are in line with the budget but pledges are under budget by about \$7K.
- Other operating income is \$12K over budget because of \$12K in special donations made in October
- Operating income of \$196K (excludes special donations) is \$8K, or 4%, under budget.
- Total income, including pass through income of \$53K, is \$278,016 through 10/31

- **Expense**

- Operating expenses are in line with or under budget through October.
- Overall, total operating expenses of \$213K are about \$13K, or 6%, under budget.
- Total expenses, including pass through expenses of \$40K, are \$264,360
- St. Peter's has an operating deficit of (\$18K) but overall has a surplus of \$14K, including pass through items and special donations.

The operating deficit is a result of \$7K in pledges not yet collected through October and no fundraising income with a budgeted amount of \$2K.

Additional detail on income and expenses is available upon request.

Account Balances as of October 31, 2014:

- Checking: \$1,672
- Savings: \$36,441
- Certificates of Deposit: \$11,550
- Youth Group: \$507
- Pantry/Outreach: \$33,427
- Mission: \$50
- Building Maintenance: \$9,015
- Concert Series: \$2944

As we finish out 2014, we thank everybody for the generous contributions so far and encourage everybody to meet their pledges to ensure that St. Peter's is able to meet all of its operating expenses.
