From the Rector

Dear members and friends of St. Peter's,

Summer has gone by quickly, and I trust that it has been a good and relaxing time for everyone. Over the summer months, we had four baptisms, two weddings, one funeral, one ordination, and a great mission trip. When Susan and I return from our vacation in India, it will be time to begin our program year at the church.

The Soup Kitchen did not take a break for summer, and continues to thrive with more people joining, both to serve and be served. Like last summer, St. Peter's has taken over Tuesday's soup kitchen with Teri Coleman and Ashley Jaden as organizers. The decision has been made to extend serving a hot meal for lunch every weekday throughout the year; a good thing especially when we consider the number of people who would go hungry if we did not offer this. Deacon Dennis has been assigned to serve St. Peter's in Phoenixville by the bishop following his ordination. By walking the streets of Phoenixville, he is able to identify more people who are hungry, homeless, and in need, and we attempt to help them with the resources we have.

We return to worship in a full church beginning on September 7, Rally Sunday, when we will bless the backpacks of our young people going to school, and children can register for Godly Play classes that will begin on September 14 as well as Children's Chapel. On Sunday, September 21, in the afternoon, a grand parish picnic is planned at Copperfield restaurant in Limerick. On Sunday, September 28, we will hold a Ministry Fair following the service.

The church exists to do God's mission in the world, and as members and friends of St. Peter's, we should be happy to know that we are engaged in God's mission of breaking down the walls that separate us from our neighbors near and far and building bridges that connect us to each other. Often Church's preoccupation with internal concerns takes her away from being in God's mission of serving the "other" both near and far. Jesus made his disciples get on the boat and go to the other side of the Sea of Galilee to meet the so called "other" as I spoke about in a recent sermon: "Crossing the Waters of Life." Preaching that sermon was difficult for me as I considered our family gathering in India and their meeting and acceptance of our gay daughter after her October wedding. This can be like "crossing the waters of life" to meet the "other". The Psalmist assurance, "Even though I walk through the darkest valley, I fear no evil; for you are with me," gives me hope.

After the emotional service on Sunday, I saw the just-released delightful movie, *100 Foot Journey*, which in a way is a secular expression of how wonderful and joyful life can be if people let go of their preconceived notions and meet in the course of our life and live together in love and harmony. The movie ends with all the characters, who used to be strangers and in enmity, breaking bread together. It gives me hope in our human capacity to rise above our differences and prejudices.

I look forward to seeing you all soon.

Deacon's Roundtable

"You shall love your neighbor as yourself." (Leviticus 19:18)

We are all familiar with what Jesus calls the "two great commandments" of the Law: "You shall love the Lord, your God, with all your heart You shall love your neighbor as yourself." (Matthew 22:37, 39). But these commandments can seem so vague that we may not know how to observe them.


Here in Leviticus, where these words first appear, there are plenty of specifics. Don't steal or cheat. Don't take advantage of the poor. Don't belittle those with disabilities or make things more difficult for them. Don't stand by idly when you could be helping someone in need. Instead of hanging onto resentment or seeking revenge, tell your neighbor what he has done wrong, and then let him resolve it with the Lord.

Jesus is just as specific. We may sometimes wonder how we can love a Messiah who is invisible and who lives in heaven. He can seem so distant to us, so different from the people we encounter every day.

Or is he? If you want to see Jesus, look into the eyes of someone who is poor, hungry, homeless, sick, or imprisoned. Look into the eyes of a friend or family member who is suffering in some way. Listen carefully to what this person is saying—and is not saying. Stay long enough to find Jesus, so that you will end up treating him or her as you would treat the Lord.

This can seem overwhelming, especially when we think about how limited our resources are. *How can I possibly show this person real love?* The key comes in God's word to the Israelites: "I am the Lord." It is as if Jesus is telling us, *Here I am, looking through the eyes of this man's homelessness, that woman's poverty, this child's woundedness. They are all "these least brothers of mine," and when you look at them, you see me. When you serve them, you serve me. When you love them, you are loving me.* Blessed Mother Teresa of Calcutta would often say that it was a privilege to care for the poorest of the poor because they offered her so many opportunities to meet Jesus. May we all find this same privilege as we minister to the needy ones among us—even those in our own families.





Universal Access Update



The Universal Access project is under way, expected to be completed in late September or before. For the first time, parishioners and visitors using wheelchairs or with severely limited mobility will be able to access worship services. Total cost will be about \$75,000. The project will include:

• New universal access ramp with railings from the parking lot to the nave of the church.

• New entry door into the nave.

• Refurbished ceiling and lighting fixtures on the ceiling of the Lady Chapel exterior alcove.

• New concrete steps on either side of the ramp.

• New concrete pad at the ground level entrance door.


• Parking lot improvements to include additional parking spaces, concrete walkway with railing parallel to the church building.

• New lighting throughout to improve visibility and provide heightened security.

• New drainage systems to manage water flow more effectively.

• Several new trees and landscaping improvements.

Thank you to all who contributed to our Capital Campaign which has made our dream of universal access a reality.





This past July, ten missioners made our 7th trip to El Salvador to engage with our friends there. This year, our mission evolved from a workbased approach to a more interactive experience enabling us to gain keener awareness and understanding of their struggle. Our focus this year was a women's group in Amatapec, spending a day in their community and traveling with them visiting sites of interest. We easily became inspired as we heard their stores of sorrow, courage and strength. They are developing a successful, cooperative business called Spirit Without Borders which produces and sells handcrafted jewelry and other useful items.

We visited the village of La Anemona for our 4^{th} year, where we have made lasting friendships. The residents of this village have had to flee from deadly mudslides and relocate once again. One resident shared with us that our presence gives them hope, and to please continue to keep them in our thoughts and prayers.

There is a quote from Mother Teresa that states the true essence of our mission so eloquently: "When we see the individual, when we learn each other's stories, when we sit, talk, look each other in the eye, when we break bread together, that is where the prejudices and the stereotypes melt away and we see each other as brothers and sisters".

Thank you to all who support St. Peter's El Salvador mission; it is a mission of the whole church that reaches beyond our borders and touches lives beyond our comprehension through the power of the Holy Spirit.

We will share more about our trip on October 19th at a special mission service and reception.
