From the Rector

Dear Members and Friends of St. Peter's,

We enter April this year in the middle of Holy Week and right away we'll be celebrating Easter. Once again, with great joy and exuberance on Easter morning, we will say: "Alleluia. Christ is risen! The Lord is risen indeed. Alleluia." When celebrating the Eucharist, it has been hard for me not to say Alleluia especially at the time of fraction. The tradition of holding back on Alleluia during the days of Lent and Holy Week doesn't make much sense to me, however, the absence of alleluia from our liturgy during this time makes you think and appreciate more of what Jesus has accomplished through his passion. Jesus, mistaken for a gardener by Mary at the grave that Easter morning, was himself the planter. What was thought to be dead and buried now comes to life with more vigor and vitality. Alleluia. Christ is risen! The Lord is risen indeed. Alleluia.

Easter brings joy and happiness into our lives, and our time to celebrate. Easter turns the first day of the week, the day of resurrection, as our Sabbath, a day of rest, feast and celebration, and legitimizes our need to chill, relax, and be playful. On Easter day Jesus, by appearing to the disciples who locked themselves up in a room, afraid and guilty, unburdened them of their fear and guilt. The resurrected Jesus, unbound himself of human limitations, was playful in all his appearances to his disciples. He greeted them each time by saying 'fear not'. He forgave them for their betrayal, denial and for their not having the courage of their conviction. Just as God in the beginning was playful in sculpting Adam out of clay and breathing life into him, Jesus, after his resurrection, turned his clay feet disciples into brave men by breathing Holy Spirit into them. God's creative work continues through us today. Unbound, unafraid and unburdened, we today are called to creatively celebrate our lives as individuals, families and communities.

How do we practice resurrected life? We need to unshackle ourselves by becoming a forgiving people. This is the first thing the risen Jesus asked his disciples to do, "If you forgive anyone his sins, they are forgiven; if you do not forgive them, they are not forgiven." We need to celebrate the ongoing presence of the risen Lord in our lives. Let us be intentional about our being and our doing. Some of us have been following the Lenten meditations on Internet offered by the brothers at the Society of Saint John the Evangelist. They talked about the importance of Stop, Pray, Work, Play, and Love in our lives giving each their due time. Unless we are intentional about these various aspects, which make our life fulfilled, the world will turn us into mere pegs in the great machinery of production. Let us claim our time, our Sabbath, and celebrate it as a risen people, as the people of our risen Lord.

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A Word From Deacon II

From Shrove Tuesday to Maundy Thursday

Have you ever wondered what those words mean? They are very nearly the bookends of our Lenten season.

I often wonder about words that we say and use but don't truly understand; but then again, that's just me. My wife often says that I wonder about more things than "normal people".

Shrove Tuesday is the day before Ash Wednesday. Some call it Fat Tuesday, which is Mardi Gras if you translate it to French.

It's called Fat Tuesday, having to do with the ancient practice of giving up meat, which is fatty. So you gobble up the last of the meat, before Ash Wednesday. The Spanish and Portuguese have the same tradition, but they call it Carnival, which come from Carne Vale or Goodbye Meat.

But I digress, because that has nothing to do with why we call it Shrove Tuesday. "Shrove" is the past tense of the word "shrive," which means to hear a confession, assign penance, and

absolve from sin. Shrove Tuesday is a reminder that we are entering a season of penance.

Maundy Thursday is the day of the last supper, and the day when Jesus washes the disciple's feet. While these are important parts of our tradition, they aren't Maundy. Maundy comes from an old French word mande, and from the Latin, mandatum. It is the origin of our word mandate. The mandate is the final from Jesus. commandment Α new commandment I give to you, that you love one another, just as I have loved you. And how did he love us? Just as we are, and full of hope for us.

P.S. Some folks have talked with me about helping out our friends that we see on pantry days, or at lunch. Sometimes they are unsure how to respond to requests for help or money. Keeping in mind the mandate proposed above, the best thing to do is to direct them toward Koshy, or any clergy. Many people contribute to a discretionary fund that is established just for that purpose.

Financial Update - February, 2015

from Frank Rothenberger, Accounting Warden



The financial position of St. Peter's through February, 2015 is outlined below.

Income

- O St. Peter's received \$42,673 in pledges and open plate donations which is about \$1,000 above the budget of \$41,660.
- o Total operating income was \$48,929 which is \$3,619 above the budgeted amount of \$45,310.
- o Total income, including pass-thru income, was \$51,537.

Expense

- Total operating expenses were \$45,634 which were covered by operating income with a surplus of \$3,295.
- Operating expenses were \$6,071under the budgeted amount of \$51,705 because of utility expense under budget and budgeted operating expenses yet to be incurred.
- o Total expenses, including pass through expenses of \$8,068, were \$53,882 through February, 2015.
- St. Peter's reported a deficit of (\$2,329) through February because of carryover pantry expenses that have been sufficiently covered by the Pantry account balance.
