From the Rector

Dear Members and Friends of St. Peter's,

The phrase, "Time is of the essence" is used quite frequently in our everyday conversations; the unique and important role time plays in our lives. Time is cyclical in nature and linear in its movement forward. When we are healthy, we say, "time is on our side" and, when we face a terminal illness or a dead line, we say, "it is against us." Time is the first thing God created, and He measured the creation using the measurement of time as day. These thoughts prompted me to ask, "how are we living our time here on earth?" This question is especially significant since we truly don't know how much time we have left to live on this side of our lives. It makes me shudder on Ash Wednesday when, as a priest, I have to impose ashes on people's foreheads and say, "You are dust and to dust you shall return."

In a Wall Street Journal article titled: "Science Increasingly Makes the Case for God", sent to me by Mike Logar, the author Eric Metaxas says: "The odds against life in the universe are simply astonishing. Yet here we are, not only existing, but talking about existing." If we are the only life form not only existing but also talking about existing in this vast universe of billions and billions stars and even larger number of planets, then the time we get to spend on our planet earth is so special and significant.

How do we treat this great gift of time we are endowed with? I invite all of us to join in a time of reflection over the course of Lent, guided by the Brothers of Saint John the Evangelist monastic community in Cambridge, Massachusetts. If you're interested, go to www.SSJE.org/time and subscribe with your e-mail. You will receive an introductory e-mail and videos will be sent to you directly. Following two paragraphs is a description of how we can engage in this interactive reflection.

So much of our stress and anxiety derives from our pollution of time. God has given us the gift of time, and called it holy, yet we often experience time as a curse. In a series of short, daily videos over five weeks, the Brothers of SSJE invite us to recapture time as a gift. Join the Brothers as we wrestle with questions of time and discover how to experience the joy of the present moment.

Each theme (It's Time to Stop, Pray, Work, Play and Love) is introduced with a video of a Brother priming us for the week's theme. The theme is explored in depth in six short reflection videos (around 2 minutes each). A compilation video is also available each Sunday. Each reflection video ends with a thought-provoking question for you to ponder over the course of the day, and then answer on the worksheet, which you can download for free.

As in the past, there will also be other avenues of reflection that you can enter into. There will be a weekly study on Forgiveness every Tuesday beginning Feb. 24 for five weeks. There will be community Lenten services every Wednesday during Lent, and then Stations of the Cross every Friday at 7 PM beginning on February 20.

I hope you will find these Lenten resources useful for you to weave together a more abundant and meaningful life.

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What's Happening At St. Peter's February 2015

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Deacon's Roundtable

"When you pray, go into your inner room, close the door, and pray to your Father in secret. Your Father who sees in secret will repay you."

(Matthew 6:6)

It is my practice every morning to go to my special place, read the daily readings, meditate on those readings and open my heart to our Father in heaven. This sets my day off on the right foot.

I'd like to think of myself as a caterpillar humping along in life and then building myself a chrysalis to make changes in how I see that life. Now can you imagine a lowly worm turning into a beautiful butterfly? This is what happens inside the chrysalis of the monarch butterfly. Scientists don't know for sure how this transition takes place, but within a few weeks a caterpillar turns into a completely different creature. Inside the chrysalis the major organs and structures of the caterpillar are completely dissolved and new ones are formed. A new heart! New lungs! Wings grow out of nowhere!

What a wonderful way to describe what happens to believing people during the season of Lent. If we really work at it we can enter a chrysalis and emerge six weeks later as a reflection of God's beauty and grace.

It's not magic; it is a combination of God's grace and our effort. Of course we have no control over grace, but we do have a lot of control over our efforts. Here are a few things we can do to help us make that transition come Easter Sunday.

First, visualize prayerfully what we want to become. What "old organs" do we need to let go of? What kind of wings are we looking for?

Second, find a chrysalis. Don't do this by isolating yourself, but set aside a regular time each day to meditate on a scripture reading. Forward Day by Day or another daily devotional is a good start. Talk to the Lord, but also remember to listen. Use a journal to record

your thoughts and what the Lord is trying to tell you.

Third, meditate on the Stations of the Cross. Follow our Blessed Lord on the way to crucifixion and death; for it is through this series of events that Jesus comes forth in new life as the risen Christ.

Finally, start living that new life. Rearrange your priorities as if you were already that beautiful butterfly. Make yourself available to God's grace through prayer and you will find yourself changing.

I wish you all a blessed and prayerful Lent.

Am I idealistic? Yep. But isn't it our ideals that lift us up? Isn't it the ideal of love without judgment that Jesus calls us to? To love unceasingly, including loving those that do not love us?

When I think about it now, I wonder why people at any time or place should have to risk their neck on a fifty-four mile march to get what others already have?

I write this on the birthday of Martin Luther King, Jr. By his own words, he was a dreamer. Maybe I have missed the point for too long. Perhaps I should be busy dreaming about the world that Jesus calls us to create for others. Can I dare to dream that His kingdom and His will might be one day be done "on earth as it is in heaven."

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Stewardship



The current St. Peter's Stewardship Committee was formed in the summer of 2011, consisting of Iris Blanche, Susan Madden-Cox, Diane Hope, Erik Paulson, and Don Hans. During 2012, Erik Paulson was replaced by Eric Sharpe. Earlier in 2013, Dave Brennfleck joined our merry band, increasing membership to six, but shortly thereafter Susan left the committee. In January 2015, Iris will be retiring from the committee, and Sarah Williams will be joining. As Diane and Don approach their 5th year on the Committee, it is time to begin a further transition of new committee members to join the group.

Although some of the following information is dated, I believe it provides perspective of the Committee's activities during the balance of the year when we aren't conducting the in-gathering campaign. During our formation in 2011, we quickly agreed upon two items - first, that we would not elect a chairperson since we were all committed to meeting our assigned tasks (still working extremely well but sometimes under pressure to elect a chair), and secondly, once the in-gathering campaign was completed, we would focus on the Time and Talent components of Stewardship. We completed our adopted theme of Grace, Generosity, and Gratitude campaign in 2012. In 2013, Fr. Hyatt compiled a survey that accumulated the activities that parishioners are involved in, and we shared that information throughout the year. There still continues to be so much that goes on behind the scenes; like the daily luncheons during the week and now a Monday evening pantry.

Our primary objective in 2014 was to work with the New Member Ministry Committee to develop a communication piece to educate our newcomers on the importance of financial pledging to St. Peter's. This information has become a part of the package already provided to all new members. We will continue to find ways to educate all parishioners about the

importance of pledging so St. Peter's can support all of its missions.

We had a successful 2015 In-Gathering campaign, with the number of pledges increasing by 4 to 70. Monies pledged increased by \$12,678. Total pledges received in 2015 were \$231,926 vs. \$219,248 in 2013. Of the 70 pledges received for 2015, 22 remained the same, 11 decreased totaling \$6,780, 23 increased totaling \$10,044, and 13 new pledges totaled \$20,540. The number of new pledges is certainly encouraging!

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St. Peter's Food Pantry

Thanks to all of you who have stepped up to volunteer to help as we have begun a successful Monday night extension of the Saturday pantry. The Phoenixville United Methodist Church serves a hot meal at 5:00 for those who wish to partake and then stay for the pantry which opens at 6:00. Some of the people come just for the meal, which may be the only hot meal they get that day. On our inauguration day on January 3 we had ten clients come to the pantry of which three were brand new. The second Monday pantry on January 19 saw twelve folks come which included three new clients. The other participants on both dates were people that usually came on Saturday but find it more convenient to come on Monday evening because of their work schedules or other circumstances that kept them away on Saturday.

A number of outside organizations have offered to conduct quarterly food drives for us which helps to keep the pantry updated with fresh items. We also have been purchasing fresh fruit and vegetables to have available for our clients so they can make more nutritious meals for themselves and their families. During the summer months most of these fresh fruits and vegetables are obtained from the Chester County Gleaning Program.

Thank you for your prayerful, financial and volunteer support as we strive to provide food for those who are experiencing hard times in their lives. Also, we offer a special thank you to all of you who have provided us with re-useable grocery bags for our clients to take their groceries home, and ask that you "keep them coming".

Financial Update January through December 2014
from Frank Rothenberger, Treasurer



The financial position of St. Peter's for 2014 is outlined below.

- Income
 - St. Peter's received about \$3K over the budgeted open plate donations of \$20K. This help offset a \$4K shortfall in pledges received.
 - Total operating income was \$267K which is about \$3K short of the budgeted operating income for 2014 primarily because of the shortfall in pledges received. Operating income excluded special donations of \$12K and pass through income of \$65K.
 - Total income was \$344K in 2014.
- Expense
 - Total operating expenses were under budget by about \$2K at \$263K. Overall, expenses were sufficiently close to the budgeted amount for the full year.
 - Total expenses, including pass through expenses of \$59K and \$10K in special donations, were \$332K for the year.
- St. Peter's had an operating surplus of \$4K in 2014 and overall had a surplus of \$13K, including pass through items, other income and special donations.

Despite the shortfall in pledges, St. Peter's collected sufficient donations to cover all of its operating expenses for the year because of expenses under budget for the year and open plate donations received in excess of the budget.

Additional detail on income and expenses is available upon request.

St. Peter's was able to end 2014 financially stable and we look forward to another good year in 2015.

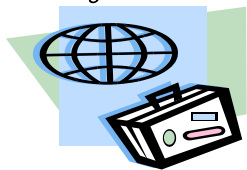

The Mission Committee continues to meet monthly with next meeting slated for February 12th at 7PM. The committee is focused on recruiting missionaries for the July 11-18th, 2015 mission with Cristosal's School of Global Engagement. The subject of focus this year will be on the immigration and human trafficking crisis.

Property Committee / Men's Group



The Property Committee is dedicated to maintaining the physical appearance and condition of the Church, to support the various missions of the Church, and to make us all feel good about calling St. Peter's Church our spiritual home. Our routine work includes cutting the grass and maintaining the general appearance of the church exterior during warmer months, and keeping the elements at

bay both inside and outside the church as well as general upkeep and maintenance of the inside of the Church all year round.

Below is a list of the primary work activities that the Property Committee has recently completed:

- Coordination with Fr. Koshy and the various church outreach ministries on the use of Jim King to address the results of any snow or ice storms at the church. Gary Russell and I will be the primary contacts for Jim and so when you are at the church following a storm please let me know if the church has not been cleared. There are orange Homer buckets of calcium chloride (for new concrete) or rock salt (for old concrete) near the doorways for spot use on ice and snow by parishioners and outside ministries. Keep an eye out for slippery spots and make use of these materials as necessary.
- The heating system has been operating pretty well (knock on wood) with only a few glitches in steam getting to a few radiators (stuck air vents). These issues are being addressed as they arise and so please let me know if you arrive at the church and an area of the church does not have heat that should.
- Lastly, on Friday January 23 H&H Systems was at the church to provide annual re-certification of the church's 26 fire extinguishers.

The Property Committee continues to be interested in assisting our parishioners on small projects they either do not have the experience to do themselves or cannot afford to hire someone to do the work. Please contact Mark Hammaker (markhammaker@gmail.com) or Fr. Koshy if you have a project that you need assistance with.

The Men's Group portion of the group continues with beer brewing which is headed by our Brew Master Dave Brennfleck. Rumor has it that Dave has a new batch of beer in the works which I know those showing up at our meetings really enjoy taste testing when he is done.

The Property Committee meets the first Monday of each month – the next meeting being on Monday, February 2nd (2015) at 7PM at St. Peter's. Please feel free to join us, have a beer, and plan to talk property (mostly) issues. Thank you,
