## A Note From The Rector

Dear Members and Friends of St. Peter's,

Wasn't it wonderful on Trinity Sunday to recognize that over forty people have officially joined our church! As the rector of our parish it makes me very happy to see that we continue to be a welcoming and inviting faith community. What makes new people join us has a lot to do with the present members keeping our church open and inclusive. The church does not belong to us; we belong to the church. To the early disciples who wanted to join his movement, Jesus' refrain was, "come and see." We want to keep St. Peter's as a "come and see" church.

Our branding committee has been working diligently on a tag line for our church that is a short and succinct text that summarizes our character. The tag line "*St. Peter's; where loving and serving are one*" really reflects what we are all about. Our community would easily attest to it that we have been indeed a loving and serving church both now and in the past. We keep finding new ways to serve our community. St. Peter's has been providing leadership and space to Diversity in Action Group in their attempt in establishing an ongoing mentoring program at Phoenixville Area School District for children who are not doing well in school and life. We're also working on extending a school lunch program available to needy children during summer months.

The other areas we're working on are communications and modernization of our record keeping. We have purchased Realm, a web-based software system specifically designed for churches that will help us integrate communications within our community, updating directory, programs, and our accounting. We are also working on our website to make it more up to date and nimble.

Currently, a group is working on formulating a new capital campaign to make our church internally more accessible, to make more room for programs and storage, and to restore and refurbish some of the areas that are crumbling.

St. Peter's is a church with members who are open and welcoming to all, with programs that help members form and grow in faith, with ministries and missions that serve the needs of the people within and without, and with facilities that are conducive to worship, study, and meditation.

May God enable our church and us to serve as God's healing and reconciling presence in our neighborhood and in the world!

## Deacon's Roundtable

Every day people in our towns and cities are facing violence through the use of hand guns and other weapons. To bring this more to the awareness of the public the deacons of the Episcopal Church and especially in the Diocese of Pennsylvania are promoting Sunday June 5 as Gun Violence Awareness Sunday. To commemorate this day the clergy will be wearing orange stoles, armbands or ribbons. We encourage our parishioners to join us in wearing orange to show solidarity.

Let me be perfectly clear that we are not in any way promoting the banning of guns in our society. We are bringing to the forefront our concern for the indiscriminate use of firearms and how they are stored and cared for.

In 2013, the last year for which we have figures, 30,000 people died in the United States from being shot with a gun. Every week two toddlers—children aged 1 to 3—shoot themselves or others with a gun.



We as Deacons of the Diocese of Pennsylvania are inviting everyone to wear orange on Sunday, June 5. We are not setting a precedent. In the 1980's many folks wore red ribbons to bring awareness to the AIDS epidemic. Many of us wear pink ribbons to bring awareness to breast cancer and its victims. For this reason we invite you to wear some article of orange to bring awareness to the crisis which is killing and injuring our people, especially our young people in this diocese and in our country.

## A Word From Deacon II

The worship committee and clergy have been discussing lately, ways to seek to "keep everyone happy" with our services. This is important and necessary work, and good folks have been quite thoughtful about this. Fr. Hyatt and Deacon Joe are developing a pew card with some helpful thoughts on the topic.

Here are some other thoughts that have been rumbling around in my head: We are a diverse group. Some have been Episcopalians for a lifetime, some for just a short time. Some come primarily for the music. Some find it pleasant to listen and sing, the choir works hard to lead the hymns, the sung parts of the liturgy and to give us an anthem. Some don't care about the music much at all. Some come to hear The Word, some for the sermon. Some don't care about the sermon much at all.

The centerpiece of our common worship is the Eucharist. Some drink, some dunk. For some the consecration words, and the prayer time immediately following receiving the Eucharist are times of intense and silent devotion. For some, a lively a boisterous exchange of the peace with everyone present is important fellowship. For others, it is symbolic, brief, and subdued.

For some, the time just before worship is a time of quiet preparation and personal gathering-in, for others, it is a time to greet friends. For some, coffee hour is an important extension of the worship and a chance to fellowship together. Others simply go home.

There is no single set of rules that can define how we are to behave in church, we differ too much in how we worship and connect with our God. What is important to remember is that if you like to chat rather than sing the hymn, that it may not be the case for the folks down the pew from you. Thumbing through the bulletin or texting during the sermon may suit you just fine, but be distracting to your neighbor.

Our spiritual diversity is just as real as our ethnic diversity. Honoring others will guarantee a pleasant and meaningful experience for all. And keep in mind that we are a big and beautiful family, but we're not perfect.

## Financial Update – April, 2016

from Frank Rothenberger, Accounting Warden

The financial position of St. Peter's through April, 2016 is outlined below.

- Income
  - Total open plate donations through March were \$8,906 which is about \$2.6K in excess of budget and pledges were \$82,168 which is about \$2K in excess of budget.
  - Easter offering was \$1,456 which falls about \$1K short of the budgeted amount.
  - Total operating income was \$97K through April after removal of pass-through accounts, Clinic rental and non-recurring income. Operating income is about \$7K in excess of budget primarily because of pledge and open plate donations exceeding budget expectations by about \$5K and \$1.5K in income for use of St. Peter's.
  - Total income, including pass-thru income of \$15K, was \$123,147.
- Expense
  - Total operating expenses were \$92,348 which were sufficiently covered by operating income with a surplus of \$6,656.
  - Operating expenses continue to be less than budget at about \$6K through April. Expenses are controlled through April because of actual expenses being less than anticipated, including utilities about \$1.5K less than expected through April.
  - Total expenses, including pass through expenses of \$14.7K, were \$108,045 through April.
- St. Peter's reported net income of \$15,287 through April.
