A Note From The Rector

Dear Members and Friends of St. Peter's,

Last Sunday, we officially welcomed over 20 new members into St. Peter's. I understand that there are at least as many more who couldn't be there on this occasion. We welcomed them on a Sunday when our gospel lesson was about the ministry of the Holy Spirit as Paraclete: as someone who walks alongside in solidarity. It means those of us who are already members of St. Peter's are responsible in being a paraclete to those who are new and joining our rolls. How exciting and wonderful to see our church growing in numbers and ministry engagements! I am truly grateful to the work of the New Member Ministry/Growth Committee in making this an annual service of new member liturgy a success.

Well, summer is upon us. In another couple of weeks, our program year will ease into a more relaxed summer mode. All the Sundays in June are significant because of their transitional aspect. First Sunday (June 4) is Pentecost, the birthday of the Christian church and the last Sunday (June 25) is our Patronal Sunday. It is time to say goodbye to Deacon Dennis. We are his home church. Normally a deacon doesn't get to serve his/her home parish until retirement.

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Deacon's Roundtable

I want to share something with you this month that is very dear to my heart. That is my annual retreat at St. Joseph's-in-the-Hills, Malvern. St. Joseph's is the largest privately owned retreat house in the country. It is owned and operated by the Men of Malvern and sits on over 200 acres just south of the town of Malvern on Warren Avenue. The retreat house is over 100 years old and was started by a group of catholic men who found great solace in spending a quite weekend with their Lord. I have been attending these retreats for over 30 years and find them to be spiritually rewarding. It was here that the Lord spoke to me and confirmed that He was calling me to the ordained ministry.

St. Joseph's is a retreat house. On a daily basis we "charge" into problems, concerns, illnesses, disagreements, tragedies and troubles. St. Joseph's is a place that for forty-two hours a person can stop charging and begin retreating. A retreat, by definition, is one's ability to find a place of safety in a time of danger.

Secondly, St. Joseph's is a holy place. It is a place where men have been praying for over 100 years. It is a place where God dwells and speaks in His way which very often is not our way. It is not a magic place where people come to leave their emotional, physical, spiritual, mental crutches, blindness and deafness. This may happen and the "miracles of Malvern" occur often, but they are consequences of what happens at this holy place not the primary reason for being here. They are secondary as any gift is secondary to the giver and to the one who receives.

So why make a retreat? Primarily, it is because God wants to speak to you. In order to listen to Him we need to retreat to a place of safety within, a place where God dwells, a real place where we meet God as He reveals Himself. Then and only then we begin to know God as He wants to be known and to "know ourselves as God knows us" (1 Cor. 13:2).

The old adage is, "I go to church every Sunday, why do I need a retreat?" Retreat allows us to experience God in a new and different way. Retreat allows us to slow down. It helps us take a look at our lives and where we are going.

I pray that our Lord will lead you to Him through this exercise in quiet spiritual devotion. Men and young men who may be interested are encouraged to see me after church or give me a call at my home (610)323-1033. Our retreat weekend this year is on July 21, 22 and 23. I'm looking forward to having you join me and our Lord. It may change your life.

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Who'sWho?



The Rev Dr. Asha George-Guiser

I was born as the third child to my parents in Kuwait since my dad, who is from Kerala, India was working for the Kuwait Oil company in the 1940s. When I was ten, we returned to Kerala and I attended the MarThoma (orthodox church) in my home town where I learned to appreciate the presence of God in worship and learned the stories of the Bible in Sunday school. I was deeply transformed by the love and care of the Roman Catholic nuns at my local school where I loved learning and serving others. My parents instilled the Indian culture by building a dance school on our property and my sister and I excelled in classical Indian dancing and I used the art of dancing in liturgy and developed liturgical dance troupes in my ministry.

At age 16, I was blessed to receive a full tuition scholarship to Neuman university as a pre – med major to come to the USA. I wrestled with my faith and the patriarchal rigid systems of the MarThoma church during my college years and realized there was no room in the inn for me as a woman of faith in my home church. I was sponsored by the Lutherans and chose to

become a Lutheran while serving in Camden, New Jersey. Upon rejection from medical school, God called me to ordained ministry and graduated from Lutheran Theological seminary in 1982, I was ordained as the first Asian woman clergy in the Lutheran church in the world on May 15, 1982. I completed my Doctorate in marriage and family therapy in 1994. God used me as his servant to serve as youth pastor, adult faith formation coach, , teacher and director, preacher for the national Lutheran assembly, national staff person for clergy vocation and mobility, assistant to the local bishop, assistant pastor for 30 years with my husband, The Rev. Kim Guiser at a local church and presently for the past 17 years being a licensed Christian counselor in practice in Blue Bell. Kim and I have a 22-year-old daughter, Preeya who is a student at Northeastern University in Boston.

When my husband and I retired in June 2016 from parish ministry, Deacon Dennis Coleman had invited us to visit St Peter's. We were drawn to St Peter's by its mission, compassion for the poor, liturgy and most of all its hospitality to a very diverse community.

My two favorite scriptures that form, transform and reform me are:

Rejoice in hope, be patient in suffering, persevere in prayer. Contribute to the needs of the poor; extend hospitality to strangers.

(Romans 12:12-13)

You are blessed when you are at the end of the rope. With less of you, there is more of God and his rule.

(Matthew 5:3)
