A Note From The Rector

Dear Members and Friends of St. Peter's,

The happenings of this past weekend once again reminded us of the human capacity to be both good and evil. Friday evening, the national network news channels gearing up to broadcast from London on the big wedding, had to report on yet another mass school shooting in the US. Early Saturday morning, America woke up to witness the history making royal wedding of Prince Harry and Meghan Markle in St. George's Chapel at Windsor Castle. These two scenes on the split screen portray the reality of life we live today. School shootings in the US have become a regular fare. Sadly, our people have become used to carnages like the one in Santa Fe, Texas and have accepted this as a fair price to pay for our right to carry and own guns. On the other side of the split screen, two young persons who couldn't be more different in their upbringing and background vowing their love to each other before God and before a diverse congregation. This is remarkable. Our presiding bishop, in his homily at the wedding, reflecting on the couple's love for each other, talked about God's love for humanity and called us to be a loving people across all our differences.

Our Good Friday world of hate is in desperate need for Easter love, which hopes, bears and endures all things. I think of our faith community at St. Peter's made up of Easter people of love. And we are called to be apostles of God's love, spreading the Good News of God in Christ in the world. Our diocesan motto is to know Christ and to make Christ known in the world. Knowing Christ is knowing God's love. And that's what we do in Church when we gather for worship. Making Christ known in the world is what we do when we are outside the church, in our places of work and activities. This is our call. Do we say, "Yes" to this call?

Each day I send out a word to reflect on. Yesterday's word was 'Yes'. The accompanying thought was this: "If you dare to say 'yes' to the prompting of God's Spirit in your heart, and if you follow where God seems to be calling you, you won't be spared trials and hardships along the way – but you will discover what it is to be alive, truly alive in Christ. And this life is for all eternity." Br. Geoffrey Tristram, SSJE. Our church is led by people who said "yes" to the promptings of God's Spirit in their hearts.

As our program year is coming to a close, I thank the members of our church who said yes to God's call to be teachers and volunteers in running our Family Ministry programs. I trust you all remember diaconal candidate Lou Steffenhagen, who was trained in our church by Deacon Joe a year ago. He is another one who said yes to God's call. He will be ordained a deacon at the Cathedral on June 9. On June 17th five of our youth and three chaperones will be on a summer mission trip to Appalachia for a week again heeding God's call. Deacon's Roundtable

There is a knock at your room door. A voice calls out, "Let us bless the Lord." Your sleepy response is: "And give thanks to God." It is 6:45 AM. Thus starts your first full day of a forty hour retreat.

Recall how Elijah fled to a cave on Mount Horeb to hide from Jezebel after he had slain the prophets of Baal? (I Kings 19:1-3, 9-13) While in that cave, he sought a word from God. The mountain was assaulted by strong winds, fire, and an earthquake but God's voice was in none of them. After all of this there was silence. Out of the silence, Elijah heard the still small voice of God speaking within him. In Mark's Gospel (6:31), Jesus said to his friends, "Come by yourselves to an out-of-the-way place and rest a little."

We all need to find God. As illustrated, he cannot be found in noise and restlessness. He can only be found in the silence of the heart. St. Teresa of Calcutta, in her meditation Total

Surrender states: "God is the friend of silence. His language is silence. Be still and know that I am God. He requires us to be silent to discover him. In the silence of the heart, God speaks to us... We need to be alone with God in silence to be transformed. Silence gives us a new outlook on life. In it we are filled with the grace of God, which makes us do all things with joy."

Men and young men who are interested in the challenge of finding God in the silence of their hearts should prayerfully consider joining me at St. Joseph's in the Hills, Malvern July 20, 21 and 22. Help me to celebrate my 34th retreat and the beginning of a new relationship between you and God.

Come let the retreat master help you develop a better awareness of God's love for you. Let him reassure you that no matter how inadequate you feel you are, God is always there to forgive and heal you.

Come accept the guidance of the retreat master, experience the peace and solitude of the chapels, kneel in adoration and gratitude before the Blessed Sacrament in the Oratory. Come to be renewed and at peace with yourself. Jesus said, "Come to me all who labor and are heavy laden, and I will give your rest." (Matt. 11:28)

Update from the Mission Committee



On April 29 the Executive Director of Cristosal, Noah Bullock addressed St. Peter's parishioners and other guests at an intimate gathering in the home of Mike and Erica Logar. Noah captivated us with an update of their extraordinary work with 638 victims of violence and internal displacement, protecting them from further harm and accompanying them when they needed it most. At the same time, Cristosal continues community development efforts in ten communities creating conditions for peace.

We are proud to report that over \$25,000 was raised between the fundraiser at the Logars (\$22,000), our Lenten Dollar-A-Day campaign (\$1400+) and the disbursement of funds from the church line item budget (\$2,400).

Thank you to all those who continue to support this vital human rights work in Central America and to the Logars for opening their home and sponsoring a most enjoyable and enlightening event.

Financial Update – April 2018
from Frank Rothenberger, Accounting Warden

The financial position of St. Peter's through April, 2018 is outlined below.

- Income
 - Total open plate donations through April were \$6,412 which were below budget of \$8,000 by \$1,588; however, this was again offset by \$98,796 in pledges through April that are higher than the budget of \$90,922
 - Total operating income was \$119,696 which is more than the expected income of \$109,449. This includes \$6,365 in Clinic rent that is deposited directly into the maintenance savings account and \$1,477 in 2017 pledges recognized in 2018 (not included in the pledge amount above).
 - Easter income was \$2,283 which is higher than the expected \$2,000 in the 2018 budget.
 - Total income, including pass through income of \$18,865, was \$138,612.
- Expense
 - Total operating expenses were \$116,131 which were above expected budget of \$102,791.
 - Operating expenses were impacted by higher than expected winter utility bills and repair/maintenance costs expensed in the first quarter of 2018.
 - Operating expenses through April included the \$2,400 donation to Cristosal that was presented to the organization during Noah Bullock's visit in April.
 - Total expenses, including pass-through expenses of \$16,515, were \$132,646.
 - St. Peter's reported a year-to-date operating surplus of \$3,565 through April which turned around after deficits reported in the first three months of the year.
 - St. Peter's reported a total surplus of \$5,965 through April, 2018.
