Also, thank you for inviting so many of our family, and friends from the community. The inclusivity and openness of our church to all people were so evident at the party. We thank you for all the praises lavished on us at the party in beautiful, meaningful and thoughtful ways by the emcee (Mike), the speakers (Gary, Retta and Rev. Andonian), and the presenters of gifts (Liz, Anne, Mona, and Judi) and for those prayers by Deacon Joe, Fr. David and the Vestry. Susan thanks the church for the special recognition and for the gift of a Coach bag given to her. The purse you have given us was so generous, and we thank each of you from the bottom of our hearts for the love that is represented in it. Thank you also for the beautiful memory album with your messages and pictures.

Both sendoffs - first by the youth and children on Cinco de Mayo and the grand party on June 2nd – and the Leave Taking Service on the Day of Pentecost were so emotional for us. On those occasions, I truly was not able to say much on the depth of our gratitude and appreciation for the people of St. Peter's. It hit me on the day after our last time being together. I prayed a lot, and I am sure in time I will come to have peace with it. Just as it was painful for me, our separation from each other may be difficult for you also. I recommend that during this interim period you as a parish organize a couple sessions to give voice to your own feelings of loss so that there could be some healing.

Once again, I thank God for those wonderful years of our ministry together. I thank God for St. Peter's for its welcoming of me, an outlier in many respects to you, to be with you as your priest. My prayer for St. Peter's is that it will continue to be a welcoming and inclusive church, not only in having people in the pews but also in having them at the Table, breaking bread together with the strangers, and in doing so we may be fellowshipping with angels unawares. This is what will keep St. Peter's at the cutting edge of the ministry of hospitality. Just as important is our continued engagement in the community by supporting the ongoing initiatives in the areas of affordable housing, environmentalism, multiculturalism, and the likes.

Though we may be apart and separated from each other, let us take comfort in the knowledge that we are bound by the love of God and surrounded by the grace of God and embraced in the peace of God.

Deacon's Roundtable

One of the issues causing us angst in our time is the presence of violence in our world, our nation and our community. Violence is endemic in our society today. It touches all of us directly or indirectly. We are bombarded with it on the daily news, in the movies and the TV shows we watch. Our children are confronted with it in our schools, on TV and in the "games" they play. Unfortunately, many of the video games children play are based on violence and the use of violence as a means of competition and winning.

Frederick H. Streets, Chaplain at Yale University, states that "violent behavior is an action taken by and individual, group, or instrument of society that *intentionally* (italics mine) demeans and/or destroys another human being or that person's property." He goes on to say "violence may be inevitable given certain conditions, but it need not be preferable...we must give our attention to what makes violence a preferable means to an end for so many in our society."

How can we, as individuals, fight the battle against violence? Bishop Franklin Turner, in his address to the Diocesan Convention in 1993 suggested "We are all aware that there are numerous issues facing us in the Church and society, but I would strongly urge that we spend a good deal of time addressing the issue of violence and developing meaningful ministries with our children. This would be time well spent."

I might suggest that this be a topic of discussion with our children at the supper table or as part of the discussions in our Youth Group meetings. It is our Christian duty to help our children learn that violence is not a normal and legitimate part of life. We must not allow them to live the perverted Golden Rule which says, "Do unto others before they do it unto you."

I pray our Loving God to be with us as we do our part to diminish the effects of violence on our children and society.

Financial Update – May, 2019

from Frank Rothenberger, Accounting Warden

The financial position of St. Peter's through May, 2019 is outlined below.

Income

- Total open plate donations were \$7,027 which continues to be above budget expectations and pledges were \$119,448 which is higher than expected through May, 2019 by about \$8.9K.
- o Total operating income was \$143,284 which included \$9,014 in rent from the Clinic.
- o Total income, including pass through/designated income of \$200,232, was \$343,516. Designated income included \$173,024 in Capital Campaign funds.

• Expense

- o Total operating expenses were \$139,232 resulting in an operating surplus of \$3,588. Discernment expenses were \$4,587 through May, 2019.
- o Total expenses, including pass-through, one-time and other designated expenses of \$63,574, were \$202,626. This included \$32,160 in Capital Campaign expenses.
- St. Peter's reported an overall surplus of \$140,890 through May, 2019.

Additional detail on income and expense is available upon request and will be reported on at the annual meeting.
