Happy New Year! December is the beginning of the Church year. It is a season called Advent, a period of time to prepare ourselves for the coming of our Lord and Savior Jesus Christ.

How can we best open our hearts to receive this precious gift given to us by God? The gift of his only begotten Son, born of a virgin, raised as a human child, grown to manhood and died as a martyr, giving his Body and Blood as a living remembrance. I am convinced that fifteen minutes set aside in our busy world to meditate on the first chapters of the Gospel writings will help us to prepare our hearts to receive this precious gift from God the Father. 
Music @ St. Peter's Presents

What is a Vestry?



The short answer is that the vestry takes care of the business of a church's operation. At Saint Peter's the vestry is composed of 9 people who each serve a 3 year term; each person can serve a maximum of 2 consecutive terms. A vestry clerk is appointed to take minutes. (Please see the front cover of this NET which lists the names and terms of vestry representatives.) These individuals have been elected at the annual meeting to serve the people of Saint Peter's.

The longer answer is that the vestry meets monthly, usually on the fourth Thursday at 7:00 pm. Please know that vestry meetings are open to all. An agenda is presented with a timeline; committee or ministry reports are circulated prior to the meeting so all are kept current. We also discuss vestry goals, current projects, and hear clergy reports.

As members of Saint Peter's, we can observe how our church looks from the outside, our beautiful building, our transforming worship, the inspiring music. We can also appreciate how the church works on the inside, the finances, ministries, property issues, etc. Being on vestry gives an opportunity to be involved with our church, but also to learn more about how the church operates and to know each other in a more personal way.
