From the Rector

Hear my cry, O God, listen to my prayer; from the end of the earth I call to you when my heart is faint. <u>Lead me to the rock that is higher than I,</u> for you have been my refuge, <u>a strong tower against the enemy</u>. Psalm 61:1-4

In the recent past I have found myself quite often alone in thought, mostly because of the uncertainty of tomorrow, the barrage of news we are receiving telling us that the world around us as we know it is changing faster than we would like to one that none of us has a clue how it will look like. Most of us have never seen anything like this. The pandemic has interrupted our lives. Some have suffered the premature death of loved ones, while others live through and with severe pain and suffering. People are losing their jobs, stock market is tanking, many of us are afraid for our health and that of our loved ones, many of us have been placed under orders not to leave our homes and to shelter in place. I grieve deeply with you the losses that we are all living with and It is also my hope and prayer that what we are learning about ourselves – about our capacity for grace, for hope, for change and for love beyond our walls – will enrich us long after these pandemic ends.

In most of our communities, orders have been given to limit or cancel gatherings in public spaces and this has been hard for all of us. At St. Peter's, we have canceled opportunities of all public worship and moved them to Phone conferences on Wednesday evenings, Zoom on Friday evenings and YouTube service on Sunday Mornings. We have also made some changes to our Lunch and Pantry programs to be carry out services.

As we face an uncertain tomorrow as followers of Christ, I would like to remind you that we are:

- A Christmas people: Jesus is incarnated in every act of love and kindness we extend to one another.
- An Easter people: We know God can reach us beyond all the barriers the world can create.
- A Pentecost people: The Holy Spirit can revive us and will be our strength in times of great distress.

In Psalm 61, we are not told why David was overwhelmed, and it is better that we do not know. If we knew his specific circumstances, we would be strongly tempted to limit God's rescue only to those in the same situation. God wanted this prayer to be prayed by His people no matter the reason their heart is overwhelmed.

When my heart is faint. Lead me to the rock that is higher than I,

- He needed the rock, a place of stability and security, something strong enough to stand against crashing waves or quaking earth.
- He needed a rock that is higher than I, a place above himself, above his wisdom, above his abilities.

I pray you all have a Blessed Easter.





Financial Update – February 2020

from Frank Rothenberger, Accounting Warden

The financial position of St. Peter's through February, 2020 is outlined below.

- Income
 - Total open plate donations were \$4,638 and pledges were \$41,643 through February.
 - Total operating income was \$50,239 which included \$1,739 in rent from the Clinic.
 - Total income, including pass through/designated income of \$20,809, was \$71,048. Designated income included \$15,370 in Capital Campaign funds.
- Expense
 - Total operating expenses were \$50,436 resulting in an operating deficit of (\$197), essentially breakeven. Operating Expenses included \$2,456 in a repair bill to Trago Mechanical (building maintenance boiler repair).
 - Total expenses, including pass-through, one-time and other designated expenses of \$51,750, were \$101,992. This included \$47,659 in Capital Campaign expenses.
 - St. Peter's reported an overall deficit of (\$30,944) when considering the Capital Campaign expenses that were covered entirely by previously raised Capital Campaign funds through February, 2020.
